I attend all my classes, I work hard to pass all my modules, and I maintain good academic performance because I know many other students are still waiting for this opportunity. Learning to budget my monthly allowance to cover food, transport, and toiletries has prepared me for the real world. It has taught me to prioritize needs over wants. My degree is not just for me. I want to be proof that when you educate one child from a poor family, you change the future of an entire household.
